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


- Poll of 600 adults in New York City and Long Island.
- Conducted from July 13-20, 2025.
- Via landline and cell phone.
- Findings applying to 600 sample are subject to sampling error of plus or minus 3.9%
- Subgroups are subject to error of up to plus or minus 10%



Mount Sinai South Nassau Truth in Medicine Poll - Key Findings

- A plurality of respondents think the U.S. is unprepared for a public health crisis – 40% think the country is prepared; 17% are not sure
- Respondents note concern about the emergence or re-emergence of a number of infectious diseases: 80% are concerned about influenza, 77% about measles, 75% about Bird Flu, and 65% about a new strand of Covid.

Q.18-21 CONCERN ABOUT EMERGENCE OR RE-EMERGENCE OF INFECTIOUS DISEASES



Mount Sinai South Nassau Truth in Medicine Poll - Key Findings


- Only 8% of respondents report that they do not have health insurance. 36% have private insurance, 17% are covered through ACA, and 25% have a program like Medicare or Medicaid
- Overall satisfaction with health insurance is quite high: 27% say they are very satisfied; 53% are satisfied; similar levels of satisfaction with prescription drug coverage 76% say they are very satisfied
- Among the 8% who do not have health insurance, nearly one-half (49%) say it is because it is too expensive. 26% note their employer does not provide it, 15% say they don't need it, and 6% say they do not know how to get health insurance
- 67% of all respondents strongly agree or agree that they are concerned about being able to afford health care for themselves and their family.


How satisfied are you with the cost of your prescription drugs?





Mount Sinai South Nassau Truth in Medicine Poll – Key Messages

- A plurality of respondents do not think the U.S. is prepared for a public health crisis
- 65% or more of respondents say they are concerned about influenza, measles, bird flu, and a new strand of COVID
- Despite skepticism about being prepared for a public health crisis, there is a belief that government should help people access affordable health care

Mount Sinai South Nassau Truth in Medicine Poll- Key Findings

- Those with private insurance are highly satisfied with their coverage and prescription drug prices
- Those covered by the ACA are more concerned and dissatisfied and expressed distrust in government agencies
- This group also placed less importance on initiatives to improve the public's overall health and wellness
- Medicare/Medicaid respondents are broadly pleased with their coverage and affordability, and are the most likely to trust government agencies
- The younger population without insurance express concerns about affordability, believe the government should help provide health care, but are not highly concerned about infectious diseases
